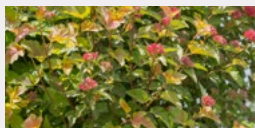
PLANTS WITH DARK FOLIAGE

Add drama and intrigue to the garden with dark-leaf plants. Pair them with other dark-leaf plants to create a moody monochromatic garden or let the dark-leaf plants stand out by pairing with bright colored plants. Check out these dark-leaf plants in the First Editions[®] collection:

PLANTS WITH SILVER FOLIAGE

Silver leaves in the garden can act as a great muted tone when trying to tie in a mix of colors. Check it out for yourself in this garden design featuring Amber Jubilee[™] Ninebark [top], Berry White[®] Panicle Hydrangea [middle], and Iceberg Alley[®] Sageleaf Willow [bottom].
